



OVER 700 LBS OF FOOD RAISED FOR THE HOMELESS

This past spring semester 2011, Nu chapter partnered up with a campus organization, Meal Points for the Homeless, and spearheaded two food drives for the benefit of the Suitcase Clinic. Students often accrue extra meal points at the end of the semester, much of which goes to waste, and said meal points could be used to gather food for local dispensaries. The first collection occurred in early April for two days, and over 225 pounds of food were gathered and donated to the Suitcase Clinic. Fraters and pledges were situated in front of the Golden Bear Café and asked fellow students to donate food, which they could purchase with any excess meal points that they had. As the first collection was successful, a second was organized at the end of the month. during the final three days of instruction. The total amount of food from both collections exceeded 700 pounds, and all was donated to the Suitcase Clinic, a large campus organization that aids the local homeless. Due to the astonishing success of both collections, the chapter hopes to supplement its annual fall semester 'Battle of the Bands' philanthropy event with annual spring semester "Meal Points for the Homeless" food drives.

HEADQUARTERS RESTRUCTURES FEE STRUCTURE

Often one of the biggest questions when rushees are considering joining TKE is how much it will cost. As part of a restructuring of fees, headquarters is lowering pledging fees by a total of \$110, bringing the induction fee down to \$35 to \$90 and the initiation fee down \$75 to \$210. However to off set this cost headquarters is increasing annual membership dues from

\$115 to \$150, moving TKE from the lowest, to the third lowest among the ten largest fraternities. Additionally each chapter will be responsible for a \$780 chapter assessment fee, which is in line with what other large fraternities. This restructuring should leave the average cost to each chapter same, but will shift costs from a member's first semester to their later ones.

Collegiate Spotlight


A LOOK BACK: WHERE WERE WE AFTER CHARTERING?



I'm happy to say though, that one of my last experiences as an active TKE was my first participation in San Francisco's annual "Bay To Breakers" race. You may




Jordon Hemingway will be leaving for MIT with a full scholarship for their Joint Program in Oceanography and Applied Ocean Science & Engineering.
