It reminds me to keep my daily challenges in a larger perspective. "We finished, tired and soaked through with sweat, but profoundly rewarded for taking another small step to honor the men and women who lost their lives in New York ten years ago.



GALE G. "BUD" MARSHALL '54 - 1932-2011

A man who loved his friends and his computers, Bud Marshall, #313, passed away August 6 at his home in Livermore at the age of 79. Born in Richmond May 27, 1932, he grew up in Oakland and attended Cal from 1950 until 1954, pledging Tau Kappa Epsilon in 1950. He volunteered for service with the Army in 1954, serving in Munich, Germany. He returned to Cal in 1957 and was hired shortly thereafter by Lawrence Radiation Laboratory, from which he retired in 1976.

While in the Teke house, he became close friends with his Frater Bruce Cowan '53 and served as his best man when Bruce married in 1958. The two men passed away within three months of each other. Bud was married only six years to Jeanne whom he married in 1965, but the two remained friends until her death.

Following Cal, Bud devoted much of his life to computer programming, writing outstanding programs. He was a pioneer in the field, where he was described as "brilliant, great and highly skilled."

He helped launch The Independent, the Livermore Valley's newspaper, in 1962 as its first investor, and continued as an ongoing consultant until a few weeks before his death. He introduced the paper to electronic typesetting before this technology was widely accepted in the publishing field, and wrote software for all its departments.

Shapter Eternal

Bud was a voracious reader of a wide variety of genres and writers, wrote poems and was an avid storyteller. Music, tennis and hiking were special enthusiasms, as was cooking. He is remembered for his stew. He was a kind and gentle person with a fine sense of humor.

He is survived by his goddaughters, Elizabeth and Christina Zirker, whose father, Malvin Zirker, was a friend from childhood.

Bud Marshall's Goddaughter, Christina Zirker, who helped us flesh out our notice of Bud's passing, also provided this photo which we believe dates from Fall, 1951. That's Bud, relaxing on the floor in front, at right. Fraters of that era should be able to identify all the others, as well.
