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

In 2005, before leaving the country for nine months on an educational sabbatical, I asked Frater Peter Cloven to take the helm of leadership and step in as the acting Chapter Advisor. Now, who doesn't love Peter Cloven? He's not only been an exemplary Chapter Co-Advisor with me, but he's also taken on the position of President of the TKE-Nu Alumni Association. Presently, I look forward with great anticipation to the many types of assistance my permanent replacement as Co-Chapter Advisor will give to the house that we all love. I am confident that like Frater Cloven, he, too, will be well received. Please welcome Nu Chapter's next Co-Chapter Advisor, Erik Lewis.

I first met Erik Lewis over 10 years ago while Eric Wilhelm and Eric Glenn of TKE International were in Berkeley helping with the rechartering of Nu Chapter. (Boy, there were a lot of Eric/ks back then!) Through attending Rush events at places like Raleigh's and Albany Bowl, I got to help the TKE representatives bring in the next generation of Tekes and meet Erik Lewis. In the second semester of his sophomore year at Cal - luckily for all of us - a friend of Erik from AXO recommended him to Eric Wilhelm as someone that they should rush. Erik rushed and pledged TKE. He immediately impressed me with his charm and upbeat, friendly personality. Erik became one of the 28 members of Alpha Class and has continued impressing me as a TEKE, student, friend, and all around quality young man.

Erik was born and raised in Sacramento, graduating from Jesuit High School in 2001. At Cal, Erik majored in Electrical Engineering and Computer Science (EECS). As a born leader, Erik was the newly rechartered chapter's first Rush Chair helping to bring in Beta Class. Erik then became the chapter's second Epiprytanis. As one of the younger members of Alpha Class, Erik became one of the lucky undergraduates who first got to live in the newly remodeled version of 2725 Channing Way. During his tenure as a Teke undergraduate, Erik went to the 2003 Conclave in Dallas, and the 2005 Conclave in New Orleans, as well as attending a Regional Leadership Conference in St. Louis. He has been, and remains, very "Go TKE!".

After graduating from Berkeley in 2005, Erik moved back to Sacramento and fell into a job tutoring high school students in math. While at first toying with the idea of getting his M.A. in Mathematics, after talking to an old math professor from Cal, Erik decided to go for a PhD. Having been accepted into UCLA's Graduate Program, Erik moved to L.A. in 2007. It was in Southern California where he met his girlfriend Nicole Abruzzo. For two of the years that Erik was working on his doctorate, he lived in SoCal with Rob Frings, the TKE-Nu Prytanis while Erik

was our Epiprytanis. Erik finished his Ph.D. in Applied Mathematics from UCLA in March of 2012.

Following the attainment of this most impressive degree, and after spending a few weeks in Europe, Erik moved to San Francisco to begin his current job as a Customer Success Manger and Data Scientist at Kontagent. He loves living in the city and the fact that it has given



him more of an opportunity to become involved with TKE.

Though I didn't make the decision to officially step down as the Co-Advisor until November 2012, I had Erik in my sights as my replacement soon after he returned to the Bay Area. We got back into contact due to his concern about the situation the chapter found itself in regarding our recently lifted social probation. ALUMNI SHOWCASE

MEN WHO MAKE A DIFFERENCE - by Andy Henning



DAN COSTELLO '51

I met Dan Costello at his Concord, CA home. This interview took place over a delicious dinner as the sun was setting on a warm evening. Outside, the crickets were chirping raucously.

The Army Years

Born in Oakland in 1925, Dan Costello attended Catholic

elementary schools and Tech High School. At Tech he played varsity baseball and was a yell leader. During this time he also began a long career of playing semi-pro baseball on weekends. Because of severe asthma as a child, Dan missed a year of primary

school. Consequently in 1943, he turned 18 his junior year and was immediately drafted into the Army Air Corps. His hopes of becoming a fighter pilot were dashed because they needed radio operators who could use Morse code.

The training base at South Dakota, at twenty degrees below zero, was an alien climate for this California boy who had never seen snow. Dan became seriously ill with scarlet fever and a double mastoid infection.

Sulfa drugs existed then, but this was before the invention of antibiotics. The army hospital missed the seriousness of his illness until a specialist examined him and sent him, by plane, to Lincoln, Nebraska for emergency surgery, which saved his life. Dan's illness delayed his transfer to the war zone with his original training class. While flying bombing raids over Germany, a number of the members of his original training class were killed. After recovery from surgery, he joined a new B-24 crew for more radio and gunnery training. His crew was scheduled to join the 8th Air Force, but the war ended, and after serving thirty months, he was discharged. During a furlough, and given senior year credit for his military training, he had been allowed to graduate from high school wearing his uniform— a practice not uncommon during World War II.

Dan Goes to Cal

In September, 1946, Dan enrolled at Cal. He joined the Cinnamon Bears baseball team and also continued playing semi-pro baseball on weekends. A scout from the Giants wanted to sign him, and approach Dan's father who managed the team. Fearing his son would not finish college, he refused— and did not tell Dan.

The TKE charter had recently been renewed after being off campus since the depression in the 1930s. Loyal alumni members Soph Goth and Bob Fraser were instrumental in bringing it back. In 1948 a TKE friend, Cal Bland, invited Dan to join. Most of the Tekes were vets and not into paddling pledges or doing things they considered childish. George Dove had earned the Silver Star for charging a machine gun nest and capturing several Germans. Cal Bland was in the 101st Airborne and made 34 jumps into enemy territory, including a jump into Bastogne during the Battle of the Bulge. Tom Morgan had been a prisoner of war. As vets, they were two to three years older than the usual freshmen, and boy did those freshman girls get an education!

Dan hosted a succession of date luncheons, consisting of a formal lunch at the TKE house, "it was a great way to invite one of the girls in your class over to the house." Dan also describes some of the parties TKE would host in the late 40s and early 50s, "We had a circus themed party and the engineers made a life size elephant and rigged a vacuum cleaner to it so that it would eat peanuts out of your hand. Also, at another party, guests would enter on a canoe that floated on a large moat, which we constructed on the side of the house."

Dan was elected Pledge President, but because he lived at home, he had to cede this honor to Bill DeMartini. Mom Costello was a member of the TKE Mothers' Club which raised money and collected furnishings for the house. Dan coached and played on all the TKE intramural teams. He was appointed to the Rally Committee through the influence of Teke Bill

Rockwell. Bill was the creator of Oski, and Dan's job was to create stunts for the diminutive bear. Dan recalls that Oski used to stand on the goal post at the beginning of every home game, and once he road out onto the field in a motor scooter. A Cal lifesaving class led to a lifeguarding job at Lake Anza in Tilden Park where he saved 16 people from drowning.

Alumni Distinctions

Graduating in 1951, Dan took with him the many friendships he had made at TKE. Later, he served as Alumni President, and is now President Emeritus. He was also on the Board of Control (the forerunner of the present Board of Directors). For many years he arranged and hosted the TKE Christmas party at the Olympic Club in San Francisco. He is quite the story teller could really entertain the group. Dan also started the tradition of inviting the wives of TKE alums to the luncheon, along with serenading them over their meals.

He has been a member of the Olympic Club for over 50 years where he has golfed, swum, and played basketball and handball. At age 80, he won the club weightlifting contest for his age group. Dan continues to exercise twice a week for two hours and play at least one round of golf.



Following his graduation from Cal, Dan went to work for Lederle Laboratories (now Pfizer) as a representative to medical and pharmacy professions. He loved his work, and got TKE frater Frank Smith to join him at Lederle where they both worked until retirement. STEVE SCHMIDT '90

I found Steve Schmidt at a flea market sale for Cal Athletics in Memorial Stadium. I noticed him in line, attempting to bid on three separate items on eBay, all limited edition Beatles ties. Steve initially seemed disinterested in the sale, but as we approached the



entrance he became enthralled. He bought three pairs of shoes, two jerseys, two windbreakers, and he even bought me a golf bag! Sweet deal. This interview took place over steak nachos on the scenic terrace of Café Durant in Berkeley.

Quaint Country Living

Steve spent his formative years on a ranch in southern San Benito County in Bitterwater Valley, where his parents still reside. Steve enjoyed the freedom that the country offered, but after graduating from King City High School in 1983 (as valedictorian, no less), he longed for the bustle of the city. Throughout his youth, Steve had driven up to Cal football games with his parents, who are both loyal fans and his father is a Cal Alum. Steve came up to Cal in the spring of his senior year of high school to enroll in the IFC formal rush for the following fall. His impetus for joining a fraternity was basic necessity--Steve's priority number for student housing was so high that he was not guaranteed a dorm. However, his initial decision to join a fraternity and especially join TKE would have a great impact on this naïve country boy, granting him lifelong friendships, "Fellow Housing Board member and one of my closest friends now, Craig Kirchner, was Rush Chair at the time." Steve's choice to join TKE was finalized and he returned to high


school announcing his accomplishment and proudly wearing TKE buttons.

As Steve will no doubt recite (as he has an affinity for dates), he graduated from high school on June 10th, 1983 and moved into the TKE house on June 17th 1983. Some of the simple things Steve chooses to remember are rather superfluous. For example, as he narrates his initial reaction to living in Berkeley Steve exclaims, "I loved being able to walk a few blocks and see every movie currently playing rather than having to drive an hour and a half to see a movie." However, I suppose that concisely explains the difference between county and semi-urban life.

During his time at TKE, Steve has garnered many distinctions. He was named "TKE of the Week" at his first and last chapter meetings. The first was for his service during pledging. As he explains, "I won with my Pledge Brother Mats Wallin for effort above and beyond the call of duty--we answered phones, shoveled mounds of sand left over from a party, and other general service during summer 1983." Steve's pledge class was quite productive and was the first to build the front deck that has been reprised numerous times over the years. Steve also served as Kitchen Steward and was elected twice as Hegemon. Steve graduated with a BA. in history and a Chicano-Studies Minor. Upon graduation, Steve crossed into post-collegiate life with his "usual flare for the dramatic" with what he describes as an incident involving copious amounts of Mountain Dew and mint chip ice cream. As he narrates his college experiences Steve maintains a sly smile and always ends his stories with "GO TKE, GO BEARS!"

From School to School

Steve is an accomplished educator. He is currently in his 22nd year of teaching high school history and his 15th year at Lowell High School. He has graded APUS History essays for the College Board and worked for the Junior State Foundation Summer School program at Princeton and Yale. In Summer 2009, Steve was a "Master Teacher" for the National



Endowment for the Humanities in Salem State, Massachusetts. Along with these acknowledgements, Steve has been able to pursue his passions abroad. While on sabbatical in 2005-2006, Steve spent five months in Mexico and three months in South America, "visiting as many archeological sites as possible". He remembers well, because he watched Big Game that year on Game Tracker from a tiny internet cafe in Guadalajara, Mexico. Also, in the summer of 2007, Steve was able to travel to Mexico for seven weeks and volunteer with orphans, which he found to be a life-affirming experience. While at Lowell High School, Steve has served as Student Activities Director, Parent Teacher Student Association Faculty Representative, Social Committee Chairperson, Graduation Coordinator, and for San Francisco Unified was the Faculty Sponsor of the Student Advisory Council, which is an inter-district student government with representatives from each high school aimed at increasing student voice for educational issues.



Work as Chapter Advisor

Steve has been a mainstay of our Chapter Advisor team for the past eleven years, but he sums it up as: "simply an honor to work with such fine young men". Peter Cloven (Co-Advisor with Steve for many years), he says, should be credited with Steve as a 'dynamic duo'. "Peter Cloven and I are incredibly

different people, but we've made an amazing team in terms of guiding TKE-Nu." Steve relates stories to me from his very first days as Chapter Advisor during meetings in the basement of Barrows Hall, "I just kind of casually walked into the role of Chapter Advisor." When asked if he was apprehensive about taking on this new responsibility, Steve seems to shrug it off and answer with a glancing statement, "When I think about my best friends on the planet, most of them are Tekes." One might assume that this declaration might not really answer the question I posed, but upon closer inspection I came to a deeper understanding. Steve felt immediately comfortable as Chapter Advisor because he naturally is a rallying point for Tekes across many generations; he conformed easily to his new role. Steve never forced himself to act as Chapter Advisor through sheer exertion, but by his innate congeniality, as explained in a later statement, "I sit with Craig and two other Tekes for Cal Football. Together, we own 13 tickets and try to get other Tekes to come out and support the Bears with us." Many Tekes, young and old, have looked to Steve for support, chapter guidance, and to reconnect with fellow fraters. Steve will continue to visit the TKE house often, even after stepping down as Chapter Advisor. He will no doubt always be greeted with great revelry. GO TKE, GO BEARS!

This program will be successful with sufficient input from drivers and riders.


NEWS OF NU ALUMNI

A BIT OF NU CHAPTER HISTORY HOW THE TEKES GOT CHANNING WAY

Based on an article from Nu News, Fall 2002

We were a fraternity without a house. And who knows how much longer that would have been the case, if it weren't for Frater Ed Dermott '49. It's a wonderful story, and Ed tells it so well:

"When TKE was reorganized at Cal in 1946 or 1947, we met in the basement of the Masonic Club next to the campus. Thanks to some great alumni (Soph Goth and others) we took steps to have Nu Chapter reactivated. The next step was to find a place to live. Up on Dwight Way was a boarding house run by Mrs. Odom. Negotiations were conducted and now we had a place to live, although it was not our own. I was away at the time, and when I got back I found out I had been elected Crysophylos (House Manager).

"During the Christmas season of 1948, Bill Graham and I were in Los Angeles for the holidays. We had been invited to a party given by some Tekes. Bill had a date, and I brought my fiancé, who was a member of Theta Upsilon sorority on campus.

While we were dancing, or drinking, or doing something, she told me that her sorority was negotiating to purchase the Kappa Kappa Gamma sorority house on Channing Way. Bill and I got on the phone to Soph Goth—or maybe it was Bob Fraser—and reported what I had heard.

"By the time we returned to Berkeley after the holidays, we found out that the alumni had purchased the Kappa house. I won't bore you with the details of my relationship with my then fiancé, other than to state the obvious. It was terminated! Believe it or not, I did not suffer too badly.

"The fraternity then moved from the Odom house to its new home on Channing Way, February 1, 1949. Although I helped purchase and install the wonderful Army surplus beds, mattresses and blankets, I never got to live in the house because I graduated in January 1949.

"I qualify all the above to my memory, which may not be too accurate. The names and times may be only approximate, and I apologize to anyone who doesn't believe any of the above."

Chapter Eternal

DAVID ERNEST FRANCIS '54 - 1932-2002

"He was the nicest Frater," said one of his colleagues when hearing of his passing. No subsequent pledge can remember ever having been paddled by Dave Francis, a very nice guy, who died November 4, 2012 at the age of 80 after a four-year battle with Parkinson's Disease. He had been living in a full-care facility for many months prior to his death. Described as a person of unusual integrity, he was respected by all those whom he met.

Born in San Francisco, September 25, 1932, he and his family moved to Sacramento when he was eight years old. He attended McClatchy High School, and then Cal, where he lived in the Nu Chapter house from 1950 to 1954, and served as Epiprytanis in the Fall of 1953. Since graduation, he served as Treasurer of the U.C. Class of 1954 and played an instrumental role in the class gift to the University, the beautiful North Gate.

David served with the U.S.Army in Germany, and then went to work in the credit department of Standard Oil in San Francisco. Following this, he earned his teaching credential at San Fancisco State and then taught in Novato for 18 years. He and wife Mary Jo retired to Rocklin where they lived at Springfield, a retirement community for about ten years, and helped to form the tennis club there. The book club there dedicated the David Brooks book, The Social Animal to the library in his name, a book that he had introduced to them for study and evaluation.

Upwards of 100 people attended a Celebration of Life for David at the Springfield Clubhouse. His mind was in a very good place when he died, said Mary Jo, feeling that he was being guided home by guardian angels.

Besides Mary Jo, he is survived by sons Richard and Douglas, and a sister Jean Lewis. Donations may still be made in his memory to Parkinson's research organizations, or charities of choice.
