There will be a lot to like about the 55th Annual Nu Chapter Christmas Luncheon on December 11. So many changes have been made that we have practically reinvented the popular affair.

Since we left the tradition of Founders Day to the Active Chapter, this is the closest thing we have to a banquet, so we have planned an event whose location and cost are expected to attract many new Fraters, making this the greatest coming together of Nu Chapter Tekes.

Mark your calendar for Friday, December 11, because even the day of the week is changed. We will be at Hs. Lordships Restaurant on the Berkeley Marina, site of several happy banquets of years past. Everyone liked the sumptuous surroundings of the Torch Room, and the view of the Campanile across the estuary—on the campus where it all began.

The cost is \$45, down from \$64 last year; drinks are less expensive, and parking is free. We'll begin to gather about 11:00 or 11:30, and drinks may be ordered at the bar, adjacent to our room, so we can begin socializing as soon as we arrive.

Lunch will be a buffet—not cold cuts or peaches and cottage cheese—but a full array of entrees and side dishes. Red and white wine will be on each table. The ladies, whose own buffet will be a more modest \$30 (because they do not require a banquet room) will be seated at their own special table in the dining room, and will join us after lunch for more visiting and perhaps serenading by some members of the Active Chapter who will also be present.

Attire, as usual, is dressy, or reasonably so.

The Berkeley Marina is more convenient to the greater number of alumni, and it is felt that the change to Friday will be more attractive to those who wish to make a weekend out of it.

Frater Peter Cloven is coordinating the event. He must have all reservations and checks by December 4. A reservation form is in this issue. Don't miss this. It's going to be huge.

Dear Alumni,

Tau Kappa Epsilon is off to another fantastic semester and year! There are so many great things happening at the house right now that are making TKE one of the best houses on campus. TKE is growing quickly with the right kind of men that will help continue to build off of what TKE has become and push Tau Kappa Epsilon to its next level.

Right now, TKE is one of the biggest, if not the biggest, house on campus with sixty-three active members. On of top of that, we have just inducted seventeen pledges who are looking forward to joining the house and becoming Fraters in TKE. That is eighty members! This semester was the first semester that we were not able to provide housing for all of the members that wanted to live in. On the one hand that is unfortunate, but on the other hand it shows that TKE is strong and flourishing in the Greek community.

Academically, TKE is also among the strongest houses. We were just ranked 5th best GPA on campus out of the 36 fraternity houses in IFC. Last semester we hit the books hard and achieved a 3.35 GPA collectively as a house. Our goal this semester is to boost this GPA rating another .05 points to hit an impressive 3.4 GPA as a house. The work ethic of the brothers right now is phenomenal and I see us reaching our goal if not surpassing it.

Philanthropically, Nu Chapter and Nationals are now partnered with St. Jude Children's Research Hospital. Our Philanthropy Chair has already started getting the ground work to do a joint philanthropy event with the Tri Delts who share the same philanthropy. On top of that, we are looking forward to another fantastic Battle of the Bands event!





























NEWS OF NU ALUMNI


Tony is married to Pam and has two grown children, Kristen and Justin.



CALVIN VERNON BLAND '50 (1925-2007)

Cal Bland, born August 1, 1975, passed away of leukemia at his home in San Jose November 24, 2007. He grew up in Oakland and attended the now defunct University High School where he met future Tekes Len Corsentino, Tom Morgan and Bill Hexner. Two days before his 18th birthday, Cal enlisted in the army, serving his country bravely in the 101st Airborne Division. He made 25 jumps into France and Germany and participated in many battles. In one, the Battle of the Bulge, his nerve and valor were sorely tested, as his unit was surrounded by the German army. If it weren't for a rescue by General Patton's tank corps, he probably would not have gotten out alive. He ended the war without being wounded.

Following the war he entered Cal as an engineering student and joined the Masonic Club where he met Bill Rus, Ed Dermott and Bill Heath. These three, plus Bill Hexner, George Dove, Peter Komor and others were the driving force behind the colony that became Nu Chapter of TKE. He also brought in his close friend Dan Costello as a pledge in 1948.

Cal left school to go to work for Pacific Intermountain Express (the transportation industry would become his career) and it was about this time that friends invited him on a blind date with Magdalene (Maggie) Welch, a lab technician at Providence Hospital in Oakland. They were married over 50 years and had four children, one of whom, Carol, became an evening news anchor in San Jose. He had eight grandchildren.

A tall man whose voice, and gritty charm resembled John Wayne, Cal could build or repair anything, once even building an automobile, and he loved helping people with their household problems. He was a man of many talents.

HERMAN WILLIAM FISHER '52 (1929-2009)

Herm was born April 9, 1929, and passed away at his Walnut Grove ranch, September 13, 2009. Following high school, he entered Cal, graduating with a degree in agricultural engineering in 1952. He will be remembered by Tekes as one of the men who constructed huge, two-story papier mache structures at the chapter house for games and dances.

He served his country honorably in the Korean war as a 2nd Lieutenant in the army. He retired from a high executive position at PG&E after 35 years. He was a past president of Walnut Grove Rotary, and active in Indian Guides and Boy Scouts. In his community, his dedication to family, work, community and church were noble and unselfish. Herm was not as active in Fraternity affairs as he had wanted to be in recent years, as he was confined to a wheelchair with leukodystrophy-- although he did attend a Founders' Day Banquet in Spring, 2001—the last time that many Tekes saw him. He lived with much pain, from which he is now thankfully released.

Herm is survived by Marilyn, his wife of 54 years, daughter Susan and son Scott and their families.
